- Review one restaurant and/or bar in your neighborhood or town. Take at least 3 pictures and:
 - Introduction (1 paragraph IEP Students/2 paragraphs TOEFL)
 - What is the name of the restaurant?
 - What is the style of food?
 - Research for 1 article with a review of the restaurant
 - Talk about the author of the article, the source (blog, newspaper, website, radio, TV) and if its online, include the URL
 - How much is a meal?
 - Critique (1 paragraph IEP Students/2-3 paragraphs TOEFL)
 - How did the restaurant look? Was it nice inside or dirty?
 - How was the service? Were the waiters fast or slow?
 - What did you eat? Drink? How did it look?
 - Were you surprised by anything?
 - Did you like what you ate/drank or not? Why? (1 paragraph)
 - Extra Credit: Interview the owner of chef!
- Begin a review of your neighborhood/town (All students 3 to 5 sentence paragraph)
 - What does Wikipedia say about your neighborhood/town?
 - Read the article about where you live, and summarize it in a paragraph.
 - How many people live there?
 - How old is it?
 - Is it famous? Why?
 - How do you travel there from the Loop? (Metra, CTA Train, Bus?)
